



Patina is a charity set up in 2001 to provide opportunities for children and young people in the Lewes district to have positive hands-on experience art working with local artists, and to help promote a strong community through the arts. Patina's flagship is the "Moving On" arts project which is community-led and marks the transition of local children from primary to secondary school and into adolescence. The project culminates in a children's carnival through Lewes every year called the Moving On Parade. This has become a rite of passage for local young people is a much loved tradition that is unique to Lewes.

In 2019 Moving On involved over 423 primary children, 50 secondary school children, 16 Lewes District primary schools and Priory Secondary School. Having focused in recent years on local wildlife (2015), great artists (2016), connections with people around the world (2017) and human flight (2018), we chose one of our most child-centric themes ever for Moving On 2019 – children's literature and storytelling: Once Upon a Moving On.

As Patina turned 18 this year and our sister organisation local youth music organisation Starfish turned 21, we came together to create a two day Young Creatives youth festival to mark these milestones. The festival started with the Moving On Parade through Lewes, followed that evening by our free Twilight Tales community storytelling event with professional storytellers and the Moving On structures beautifully illuminated. The festival continued the next day with Starfish in the Park live bands in the Paddock, where we held our 2019 Patina exhibition.

Community Engagement

In February we trailed the announcement of the 2019 theme by anonymously posting images of characters from children's books in recognisable places around Lewes. The posters were created for us by 13 year old Priory student Louis Tyszkiewicz and caused much intrigue.



We announced our 2019 theme by video at our 18th birthday party fundraising event at Lewes Town Hall to which the whole community was invited. People who had been involved in Moving On over the years attended and, given that we were turning 18, local pubs very kindly offered prizes for a “Pubs for Patina” raffle.



In the following weeks, we invited people to tell us their favourite children's books. Teachers reported that it was a very “hot topic” in classes across the district as school children discussed their favourites and let us know which books they would like in their parade. In a survey of preferences in the wider community it was interesting to see which were the enduring favourites and learn about older generations' childhood books, many of which are no longer in circulation.

Central Fundraising

Patina covers the majority of the cost for Moving On through central fundraising with schools making a contribution through parental fundraising and children's entrepreneurship projects. We put a lot of effort into applying for grants and run fundraising events throughout the year to make Moving On happen for another generation of children. Our fundraising pays for all the materials, production, licencing, facilities, coordination and communications. We also apply for additional grants to try to help smaller schools and those with higher numbers of children from disadvantaged backgrounds.

For Moving On 2019 we hired out handmade lanterns in our "Light Up Lewes" campaign. Over 60 lanterns were hired by shops, businesses and families around town.

For the past 5 years Lewes FC have very generously let the children play at their Dripping Pan stadium in our Dream Team five a side football tournament for girls and boys in years 5 and 6. 14 squads battled it out for the Patina cup, which was presented to the winners by Lewes Mayor Cllr Janet Baah. Priory sports leaders were a huge help, acting as referees and scorekeepers for the epic tournament.



We also produced locally sourced Moving On t-shirts as a souvenir of the project and a fundraiser for Moving On, featuring the beautiful 2019 Moving On logo created especially for Patina by local designer Emma Carlow who also designed the program for the parade.



Coordination and Theme Development



Throughout the year we held meetings with parent and staff representatives from our schools, to coordinate the project, develop ideas, raise funds and keep everyone informed. Great team spirit developed and it was a real pleasure to get to know and work with these dedicated and generous volunteers.

At a meeting in the spring, a representative from each primary school choose a paper boat at random from our little fleet, in which was hidden the book that their school would represent in the Moving On Parade. A tense moment!



Adult Masterclasses

Every year we invite year 6 parents, carers and staff to attend a masterclass in carnival arts, as part of their schools subscription, where they learn from Patina artists skills they need to help the children make their costumes in school. Around 50 parents participated in these masterclasses.

There were wonderful expressions of community along the route. In addition to the huge numbers of people who came out to support the children and enjoy the spectacle, members of Lewes Town Council attended the event to honour the area's children, our presenter Michael Blencowe and the town crier announced the schools as they passed by, a market holder offered cherries to the children on their way past and the local fire brigade came out to gently spray the children down as a cooling treat on a hot day as they paraded uphill.

Parents did so much to make Moving On possible and joined in the spirit of the fun on the day. Volunteers very kindly acted as stewards, ensuring the children's safety through management of the rolling road blocks along the route.



After the hour-long parade the children returned to the Paddock in central Lewes for a party with excellent Starfish youth bands playing and an abundance of fruit kindly donated by Bill's.

Twilight Tales



To build on our storytelling theme and give the children and the wider community an additional event to enjoy, we organised a free community storytelling festival called “Twilight Tales” in partnership with Starfish music. We employed professional storytellers and were delighted that hundreds of people came along for a magical evening of storytelling under the setting sun.

The exhibition gave friends, family members and members of the wider community the chance to see the costumes and sculptures close-up and appreciate all the hard work, thought and creativity that the children have put into their designs and constructions.



18 Years in the Making

2019 marked 18 years since Patina was set up to provide artistic opportunities for local young people as a dynamic response by local parents, teachers and artists to the reduction in focus on the arts in schools in the national curriculum.

To mark the occasion we gathered the people who originally founded Patina all those years ago, heard their stories of how they made it happen and discuss how they feel about the tradition they have created.

Assessment

Patina's primary aim is to provide new creative opportunities for the widest possible range of children and young people in the Lewes area to work with and alongside local artists. We feel that Moving On 2019 was a success. We hope that it gave the children a strong sense of belonging and that it made a contribution to the ongoing wellbeing and cultural health of the local community.

The theme was extremely popular with the children and people of all ages enjoyed re-visiting their childhood tales together. The coordination and planning with all the different partners, the multiple children's design sessions with our artists, their making workshops and ultimately the parade itself went very smoothly. The end results were extremely positive, most importantly for the children who by all accounts really enjoyed and benefitted from participation in the project.

Patina is a community based organisation that relies on a large number of volunteers to support and sustain its activities. Through this joint endeavour in 2019, it brought hundreds of people together and helped form new networks, friendships and partnerships. Moving On also provided young people with an early experience of participation in the life of their local community. Feedback tells us that people appreciated the process of developing the Parade and participating in associated Patina events reinforced a vibrant and active local community.

Pressures on finances are increasing for everyone and affordability and sustainability are important parts of our planning. Patina assists with expert fundraising advice to schools and provides a forum for ideas and solutions in our rep meetings. We do everything we can to keep costs very low so that everyone can participate regardless of their income. Thanks to the support of grants and sponsors, and the success of the Patina fundraising events, we covered a considerable part of the costs ourselves through central fundraising to ensure that the parade is affordable for all.

We want all children participating in Moving On to have the same experience and access to artists, regardless of the school they go to or their economic background. We were delighted to get a grant from the Sussex Community Foundation to help subsidise smaller schools and those with higher numbers of children on pupil premium, who understandably find fundraising more difficult.

We have a very inclusive ethos and take into consideration all issues of accessibility to ensure that children with disabilities are able to participate on an equal basis with their peers in celebrating their transition to secondary school together. We were delighted to have ten children from Chailey Heritage School with complex disabilities in the 2019 parade and the school tells us Moving On is now very much part of their school tradition.

We placed even more focus on the environment this year, looking in particular at our use of plastics and how alternatives can be found. We intend to continue and accelerate this work in 2020, reviewing all our materials and impacts against sustainability criteria.

The addition of Twilight Tales was a very popular innovation, bringing a storytelling festival to Lewes for the first time with excellent feedback. Our partnership with Starfish worked well, bringing together two organisations committed to providing creative opportunities for local young people.

Finances

We spent much of the autumn making grant applications and were successful in getting grant funding for Moving On 2019 from national and local funds. Every year we need to raise about two thirds of the costs ourselves through our own fundraising events and activities, plus school subscriptions. The average school payment to Patina is £150, which is made up of a subscription of £60 and £5 per pupil participating. Despite increasing costs for materials etc, we have not raised fees since 2014.

Our own fundraising events included a successful and popular Christmas lantern campaign through which 60 lanterns were hired, our Ditch the Detox party of the Town Hall, our Dream Team 5 a side girls and boys football tournament and sale of t-shirts. Thanks to the grants we obtained, donations and community support for our own fundraising activities, we successfully covered all our costs in 2019.

We made Twilight Tales a free event, so that cost was not a barrier to participation. We shared the event costs with Starfish, and were able to cover some of the costs with our midnight feast café and bar during the evening. The resultant cost to Patina was £500, which we were happy to commit to this successful project for the benefit of the community. If the event is to be repeated we will need to reflect further on how costs can be covered, to make it financially sustainable.
